

We used monel "cattle ear" tags attached to the dorsal fin from about 1955 to 2005. We started using PIT tags in 1999, using both tags for 7 years to determine the amount of tag loss for each tag type. Fish lost more than 30% of the monel metal tags we attached, while basically 0% of the PIT tags are lost. We insert the $\frac{1}{2}$ inch long PIT tags behind the base of the skull plate with a large needle syringe.
